

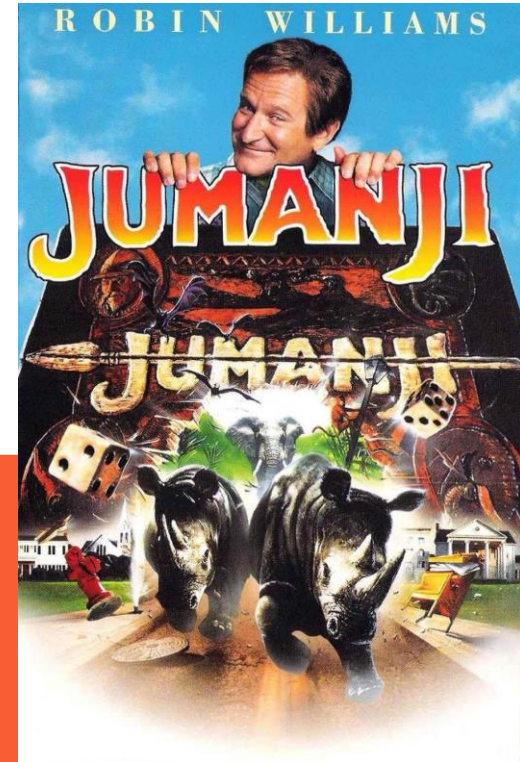

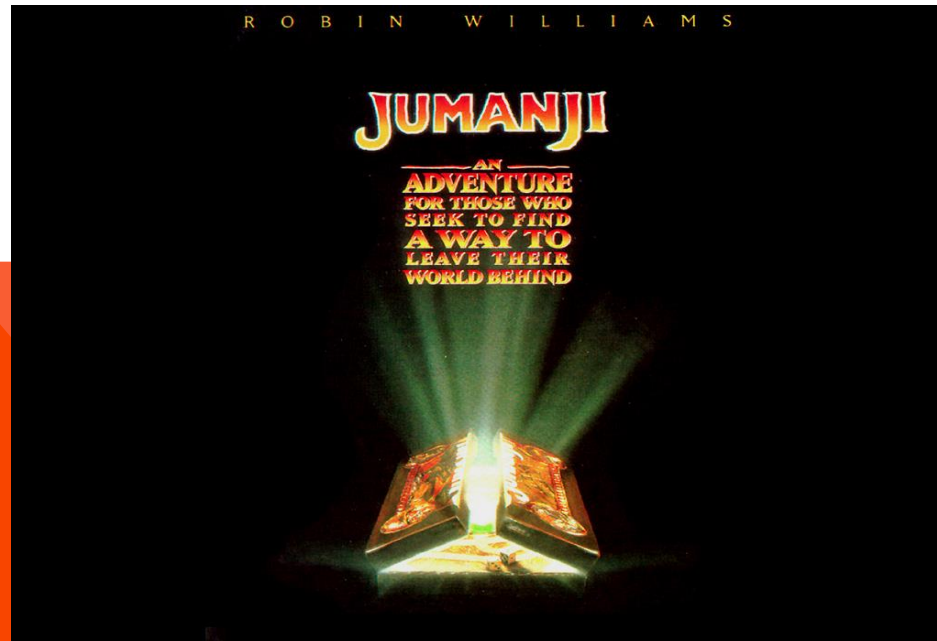

# PLOT

In 1869, two boys bury a mysterious chest, which produces the sound of beating drums, in the woods. One hundred years later, a 12-year-old, Alan Parrish, gets trapped in *Jumanji* while playing the game with his friend Sarah Whittle in 1969. Twenty-six years later Judy and Peter Shepherd are moving to Alan's old house and find the game, which Alan was trapped in. While they were playing, Peter accidentally freed Alan, not as a 12-year-old boy but as a 38-year-old man. Also, the two kids don't free only Alan, but also lion monkeys and bugs which are bringing a chaos in city. Now, the two kids, Alan and his childhood friend must play the game so everything gets back to normal.



# SPECIAL EFFECTS, SOUND AND COSTUMES

*Jumanji* has amazing special effects, with perfect graphics. The fake lion monkeys, zebras and all the other animals look real and the fake flood in Alan's old house too.

The sound is, also, very good; the score is perfect, especially the drums that call Alan, Judy and Peter.

Lastly, the costumes of all actors are simple, not very elegant, but with vibrant colors.

# EARNINGS AND RATING

**In the United States and Canada, *Jumanji* topped \$100,475,249 in the box office and in other countries \$162,322,000 respectively. Eventually the film earned \$262,797,249.**

**50% of 32 critics gave the film positive reviews, with a rating average of 5.6 out of 10.**
