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- Hippie subculture began its development as a youth movement in the United States during the early 1960s and then developed around the world. Its origins may be traced to European social movements in the 19th and early 20th century such as Bohemians.



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- ▶ Eastern religion and spirituality. From around 1967, its fundamental ethos including harmony with nature, communal living, artistic experimentation, particularly in music, and the widespread use of recreational spread around the world during the counterculture of the 1960s, which has become closely associated with the subculture

HIPPIE FASHION

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- Both men and women in the hippie movement wore jeans and had long hair, they wore sandals or went barefoot. Men often had beards while women wore little or no makeup, with many going braless. Hippies often chose brightly colored clothing and wore unusual styles, such as bell-bottom pants, vests, tie-dyed garments, , peasant blouses, and long, full skirts; Asian, Indian, African and Latin American motifs were also popular



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- Much hippie clothing was self-made , and hippies often bought their clothes from flea markets and second-hand shops. Favoured accessories for both men and women included Native American jewellery, head scarves, headbands and long beaded necklaces.





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
